
Mississauga wins but has worry

Mississauga wins but has worry

BURLINGTON — (Staff) — Mississauga Canoe Club swept to its third successive regate triumph of the Western Division paddling campalgn this season but a small hand of Cartierville boys cast a shadow over the Port Credit crew's onesided win.

A group of eight from Cartierville stayed over after the Dominion Day racing and won five races of the Mohawk club's regatta here Saturday before they packed up and headed home for a program yesterday at the Eastern Division's Otterburn Club.

While Mississauga regstered 216 points here. Cartierville's 42 points spoke volimes. This is the year Mississauga hopes to prevent Cartierville from winning its 10th successive Canadian crown, but if eight can make a fiverace dent in the Western Division, what have they in reserive for the Canadian

A heartening Mississauga transition from juvenile to juvenile ranks has been made by Terry Leswick. Terry dominated juvenile paddling last year, taking part in six firstplace Canadian efforts. On Friday he won the junior tandem with Jim Reardon, was a member in the winning senior four, the 1,000-and 1,500-metres war canoe wins.
