

Even the elements can't stop St. Kitts

ST. CATHARINES — Despite winds of gale proportions that caused an unprecedented 2½-hour delay in yesterday afternoon's program, almost everything went according to form as the 95th annual Royal Canadian Henley Regatta ended.

St. Catharines Rowing Club won its 17th consecutive regatta championship, scoring a record 476 points. Jim Dietz of the New York Athletic Club won his eighth championship singles in the past 11 years and his clubmate, Dr. Larry Klecatsky, won two more gold medals.

38 MEDALS
The 30-year-old Dietz estimates that he has won 38 medals since making a regular pilgrimage to the Canadian Henley starting at age 16. Klecatsky, 34, a New York physician, who has collected 44 medals, won the senior 155-pound singles and combined with Dietz to take the senior heavy doubles yesterday.

The only major upset of the week came just before the program was held up by bad weather, when Gary White of Winnipeg, a 44-year-old employee of the Rocky Mountain Penitentiary, won the senior 145-pound singles by more than a length over Klecatsky.

White, who never has rowed internationally, said it was the most exciting moment of his career.

"When I heard Dr. Klecatsky was racing against me I didn't think I had the chance and I still can't believe I have my first Henley gold medal," said White, who recently became a grandfather.

The big individual winner was 16-year-old Mike Buzenski of Wyandotte, Mich. Boat Club, who took home five gold medals from victories in the junior and senior 145-pound doubles, the junior 145-pound singles and also stroked a four and an eight to wins.

FAR BACK
Runner-up to St. Catharines in points was Hamilton Leander, far back with 139. The only Leander weekend win was Saturday in the 500-metre dash for eights.

They were followed by Wyandotte, 132, New York A.C., 105, and Victoria, B.C., 101.

Toronto's Hanlan Boat Club made its most impressive performance in three years at the Henley with 88 points, including a final-day victory in the senior 145-pound fours, stroked by Paul Harly.

Hanlan placed eighth among the 64 competing clubs and the 105-year-old Argonaut Rowing Club settled for 12th place with 54 points.

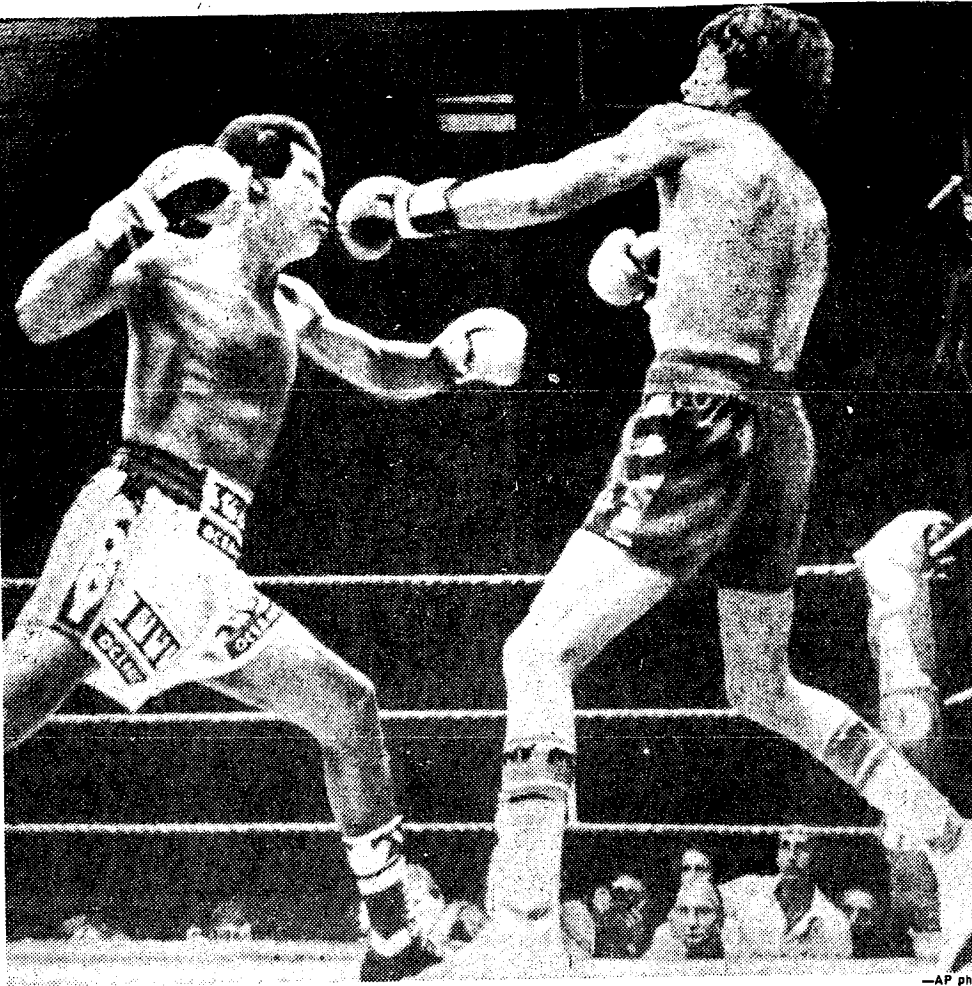

Easy wins for B.C. women in qualifying track meets
EDMONTON (CP) — Patty Loverock of Vancouver posted easy victories yesterday in the women's dash events on the closing day of the World Cup of track and field.

Loverock, well-seasoned in international competition, showed the benefit of a week-long layoff as she cruised home first at 100 metres and again in the 200-metre sprint.

The triumphs qualified her in both events at the American zone trials to be held in Guadalajara, Mexico, and made it almost certain she will advance to the World Cup at Dusseldorf, West Germany, Sept. 2 to 4.

Loverock and Debbie Brill, of Langley, B.C., friends who both work for Action B.C., a government-subsidized non-profit organization, were among a handful of standouts in 30 events over two days.

Brill described herself as sluggish but won easily in her specialty, the high jump. She expects to win at Guadalajara and fit in the

Canada swamps canoeing foes

MONTREAL (CP) — Canada took 29 of 32 events during the weekend at North American Canoe Championships at the Olympic Basin.

Canadians took 14 of 16 races yesterday against U.S. paddlers and finished with 212 points for the two-day event compared to 44 for the U.S.

In the men's senior singles kajak, Reed Oldershaw of Mississauga took first in three minutes, 55.86 seconds. His brother, Dean, and Peter Potast of Montreal combined to win the senior men's 10,000-metre tandem kayak race.

Jeremy Abbott and Greg Smith, both of Port Credit, Ont., combined to capture the men's 1,000-metre tandem canoe race in 4:00.08 and then the Oldershaw brothers — Scott, Dean and Reed — joined Alwyn Morris of Coughnawaga, Que., to capture the men's 1,000-metre K4 race.

Ivan Charalambos of Carleton Place, Ont., captured the men's 10,000-metre single canoe race while Steve Kelly of the United States was the winner of the men's 10,000-metre kayak singles.

Sue Holloway of Ottawa, Anne Dodge of Dartmouth, N.S., Karen Lukanovich of Montreal and Cynthia Weir of Halifax were part of the winning team in the senior women's 500-metre K4 race with Holloway following with a win in the senior women's 5,000-metre singles kayak.

Karen Tippett of Ottawa and Lucie Deschene of Lachine, Que., joined to win the 5,000-metre tandem kayak race to complete a sweep of the women's events by the Canadian paddlers.

The Canadian Canoe Association chose a 12-member team to compete in the world canoe championships in Sofia, Bulgaria, Sept. 1 to 4.

Abbott and Smith, who took Saturday's 500-metre tandem canoe race, were chosen to the men's canoe team along with John Wood. Scott and Dean Oldershaw, winners of the 500-metre tandem kayak race, will be joined on the kayak team by their brother Reed as well as Potast and Morris.

Dodge, Holloway, Lukanovich and Montreal's Lucie Guy were picked to the women's kayak team.

Dave Finlay of Carleton Place will be team manager and Scott Lee of Mississauga is coach.

World albacore yachting won by Toronto brothers

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP) — The Poyntz brothers of Toronto — skipper Barry and crew member Gary — won the world Albacore sailing championship Saturday by capturing the decisive seventh race.

The Poyntz went into the race needing victory to add the world title to their Canadian championship and out-sailed Roger Green of Hawkestone, Ont., and Art Ellis of Westport, Conn., to claim the title. All three boats went into the final race of the series with a chance to take it all.

Green, who finished third in Saturday's race behind the Poyntz and Ellis entries, fell from first to second over all in the final standing.

The Poyntz boat finished with 27 penalty points in the seven races. Green was second in the 60-boat fleet with 29.4 points to Ellis's third-place 32 points.

Richard Storer of Hawkestone finished fourth in the final standing with 42.7 points.

Others in the top 10 after the final race over a seven-mile triangular course were: John Luard, Annapolis, Md., 57.8 points; Earl Shore, Newport, R.I., 83; Nick Hancock, Toronto, 103; Robin Foster-Taylor, Essex, England, 109 David Wallerstein, Washington, D.C., 124.7, and David Medhurst, Toronto, 130.

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West Rouge crew is on the way back

Although the West Rouge Canoe Club has fallen on some hard times recently, its members indicated the beginning of a new era during their 20th annual regatta.

The club had seen years of success with several Canadian and North American titles during the 60s, but fell almost apart after high seas on Lake Ontario wiped out its clubhouse in 1973 and its rebuilding got bogged down over jurisdiction in the jungle of municipal bureaucracy.

With the new club facilities now almost ready, the remaining 36 West Rouge paddlers have an ambitious water safety and racing program to attract local youngsters. Members also hope for support from the Scarborough recreation department in their rebuilding program.

Because of small numbers, West Rouge was no threat in the Mississauga-dominated waters of Lake Ontario, but the club didn't run the regatta with the intention of being a perfect host.
