

TS & CC Wins Burgee From Balmy Beach

Toronto Sailing and Canoe Club's paddlers rallied to take a one-point burgee win over Balmy Beach 102-101 at Mohawk CC's annual regatta on the Burlington waterfront Sunday afternoon. The Red Circle blademens won nine of the 17 races.

Mississauga CC, whose boatmen had won eight races and compiled 94 points to win their own annual regatta the day before at Port Credit, dropped to three and 73, respectively, Sunday. West Rouge won one event and gained 10 points; and the hosts earned eight points.

Sudbury sent the Desrochers brothers, Dave and Joe, possibly as reminders of their own regatta this Saturday. They earned five points.

An upset win was that of Mississauga's Tom Jamieson in the senior canoe singles. Racing as a junior up to Sunday, Jamieson, by winning, automatically put himself into senior category for this most important event for the rest of the season. He edged veteran Bill Collins of Mississauga.

Harold Heine, Mohawk's bantam wonder, was in his seventh, eighth and ninth winning boats of the season in the supplementary races. Ever since the Western Division's 13-and-under boys began competing at TS & CC's regatta June 23, he has been in the winning singles, tandems and fours craft. He and his crew lost only on Dominion Day to a Carleton Place boat. Adrian Taylor has been his partner in the tandems, Andy Adams and Mike Ireland joining in for the fours.

It was Toronto Sailing's first Western Division win this season. They had been top point scorers Dominion Day, but Mississauga, and Beaches had won the other three division burgees, Mississauga getting two.

Win Own Meet

Mississauga Canoe Club, whose paddlers won the first regatta of the club's three-year history in the season opener at West Rouge June 16, came through with eight wins and 94 points Saturday to annex the burgee at their own annual, on the Credit River.

Toronto Sailing and Canoe Club won four of the 17 point-awarding events and compiled 82 points, for second spot. Balmy Beach CC won four races, to gain 80 points; one victory went to West Rouge CC which edged Mohawk CC of Burlington 24-21 in points, won the other race.

Four bantam and three girls' races were added events, to make up a 24-race program.

For the first time in a good many years, the girls competed in singles and tandems canoe races. They had been on the card in war canoes at TS & CC's regatta and Dominion Day at Long Pond. Most of the entries were from the host club's roster of members. A membership drive of the last three years which included dances for teenagers, has apparently paid off in a sharpening of interest among the male paddlers' girl friends. The distaff races are no frolics, although a few swampings occurred Saturday in the singles and tandems, because of inexperience.
